Chairman's Message

On behalf of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, I present the 2018–2019 Social Justice Statement, A Place to Call Home: Making a home for everyone in our land.

The Statement reflects the deep concern of Australia's Bishops at the growing problem of homelessness and insecure housing in Australian society. All over our nation, a ruthless housing market leaves people struggling to find secure and affordable housing, whether they live in cities or in regional areas. That struggle has a corrosive effect on family life, on employment, on study and on our capacity to contribute to and benefit from our society. At its worst, the struggle leaves the vulnerable in our society homeless sleeping on the street, in cars or in doorways, or hoping for a space on someone's couch or floor. The last Census showed the number of homeless Australians had increased to more than 116,000 people.

The document begins with Jesus' famous parable of the Good Samaritan - as challenging to us today as it was to his hearers. We are reminded that we have the same experience as the Samaritan: we see people in the street who are in need of help, wounded by violence, misfortune or poverty. We face the same choice: do we walk past or do we stop and help?

Behind the people on the streets is another legion – those who are battling to keep the roof over their heads, wondering if they can make the next rent or mortgage payment. Often, these are people who are employed but whose income is barely enough - or not enough - to keep themselves and their families housed and fed.

The Bishops emphasise that housing is a human right, asserted by documents like



the UN Declaration of Human Rights and by the teachings of our Church. Housing, the Bishops say, is 'an essential entitlement for all people to meet their basic needs, flourish in community and have their inherent human dignity affirmed and upheld by others'.

That human right and the call of the Church has been reinforced by the words and example of Pope Francis, who has made it a priority to reach out to the disadvantaged and marginalised of Rome, including homeless people.

We pray that Australia will hear the challenges that this Statement offers: to confront an economy that has allowed housing to become out of the reach of so many; to reach out, like the Samaritan, to the wounded and helpless; and to call on our governments to make hard decisions that will allow everyone in our communities to find secure accommodation. The Statement's concluding sentence is a message for all of us: 'Everyone deserves a place to call home'.



In Tímes Past ...

An Australian priest, enjoying a cruise to New Zealand in 1937, wrote extensive letters home which were published in the Australian Catholic press. They make for fascinating reading.

His visit to New Zealand's capital city, for instance, brought home to him the aptness of its nickname of 'Windy Wellington'. This was evident even as the



large ocean liner tried to berth. 'One of the new and up-to-date wharves had been allotted to us for our berthing,' the priest noted, 'but so fierce was the wind that they could not get the big ship there, and we had to get into the best place we could. Here was man's great 20,000 ton liner helpless in the winds of Wellington.'

Used to a flatter town, he was also struck by the hilly city. 'The streets run up and up and up, wriggle and twist at most fantastic angles. I did not expect to see, nor did I see, any stout people in Wellington. How could they be with all the climbing they must do?'

But he became quite critical, even hoping that 'every Wellington reader will excuse my critical mood.' He did not like it much, and thought it 'old and shoddy, instead of being bright and beautiful.' 'Wellington has grown old and has been allowed to look old', he asserted. 'Most of the old buildings are of wood and badly in need of painting,' he noticed. Even the churches did not escape his critical eye. 'One church had a very drunken looking spire and seemed to be in a hopeless state of disrepair. They might have earthquakes along this way very often, and so repairs might be useless — I do not know.' But at least he found the Pro-Cathedral of St Mary of the Angels to be 'a beautiful building, very clean and beautifully kept'. It was a small compliment, although it came after a lengthy explanation as to how difficult it was to gain entry.

Not Our Own Children by Fr Ron Rolheiser (excerpt)

The children we have are never really ours. They are given to us, in trust, for a time, a short time really, and we are asked to be mothers and fathers, stewards, mentors, guardians, teachers, priests, ministers, and friends to them, but they are never really our children. They belong to somebody else, God, and to themselves more than they ever belong to us. If we accept this, we will be less inclined to act as "owners" of our children and we will be less prone to manipulate our children for our own ends, to see them as satellites within our own orbits, and more inclined to love, cajole, challenge, and correct, even while giving them their freedom. When we realize, in the healthy sense, that our children are not really ours, we also realize that we are not alone in raising and caring for them. We are, in a manner of speaking, only foster parents. God is the real parent and God's love, care, aid, and presence to our children is always in excess of our own. God's anxiety for our children is also deeper than our own. Ultimately, you are never a single parent, even when you don't have a human spouse to help you. God, like you, is also worrying, struggling, involved, crying tears of solicitousness, trying to awaken love. What is consoling is that God can touch, challenge, soften, and inspire at levels inside of a child that you cannot reach. Moreover, your children cannot, ultimately, turn their backs on God. They can refuse to listen to you, walk away from you, spit on your values, but there is still another parent from whom they can never walk away, whom they carry inside. God is also there and can redeem our children and make them whole beyond any tragedy that might befall them. We can risk having children since God risks it. Finally, and perhaps most consoling of all, realizing this can do more than a little to bring some peace and joy into the hearts of those who have lost children tragically - to accidents, but especially to suicide, drug and alcohol related deaths, and other such things that make parents second-guess, worry about their failures and betrayals, and worry about all the things they should have done. When this child died, in whatever circumstance, he or she was received by hands far gentler than our own. They left our foster care and our powerlessness to fully embrace them to live with a parent who can fully embrace them and bring them to joy and wholeness that we could never quite give.
